














To teach you about how to read and to write And interpret the films you watch every night To 'decode' they may say, looking out at the faces, See the world through the eyes of those in different places.

Because our words are how we say what we mean So don't be reluctant, be heard and be seen.
































PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND HEALTH Hākinakina Me Te Hauora

Outdoor Recreation and Sport

The purpose of Outdoor Recreation and Sport is to expose our students to the outdoor/adventure tourism industry through a variety of challenging outdoor activities. The activities that students engaged in this year were: Adventure Based Learning Games, Rock Climbing, Abseiling, Mountain Biking, The 'Tough Guy and Gal Challenge' and Surfing. Through participating in these activities students learn to:

- Develop learning through direct personal experience
- Develop intellectual, physical, spiritual, social and moral development through participating in challenging outdoor experiences
- Build self-esteem and self-confidence
- Develop an awareness of the needs of others
- Learn how to negotiate risk safely, in a variety of contexts and environments
- Develop communication skills
- Develop management strategies for self and others
- Develop leadership skills
- Move outside their comfort zone

During this unit students learnt a lot not only about the skill of surfing, but how the ocean itself works, including gathering knowledge of wave formation, rip currents and ocean safety. DRAMA Mahi Whakaari

The Drama year began with the Senior Drama students trip to the Pop Up Globe in Auckland to experience the production of William Shakespeare's 'Hamlet'.

We then moved into preparing our production of the play 'Antigone' written by Sophocles' at the end of term one. Some found the Ancient Greek drama challenging, interesting and different to things they had done before. The Devised drama was structured around the stories of migrants in New Zealand and performances of excerpts from New Zealand plays were a highlight.

Spanish

It has been a great privilege for me to join the WHHS family as the new Spanish teacher and to take over the long and sustained work done by Mrs Parker, teaching and promoting Spanish in Western Heights for close to 15 years. Her commitment and support of students shows in the love for learning and the great command of the language all students in the Spanish programme show. One highlight of the year in the junior school has been the establishment of a Spanish pen pal agreement with students from Napier Girls High school. Under this, our year 10 students exchanged letters in Spanish with their counterparts in Napier. The letter writing exercise helped our students discover how much Spanish they knew and how much they could communicate by writing. We hope to continue our collaboration with Napier Girls and continue fostering the growth of Spanish in our students.

This year in the senior school we were fortunate to have had several international students from Chile and Germany join our classes for different periods of time. Our local students have been great class hosts and have been very welcoming and supportive of our visitor students. In return, our international students generously shared with us about their lives, cultures and costumes back in their home countries, making our classes more diverse, culturally rich and of course, full of their native and authentic Spanish.

No Spanish class is fully complete without "Spanish Fiestas" and this year we have been able to celebrate several events incorporating sounds, colors and flavors from the Spanish world. One special celebration planned and organized by the year 13 students was Chile's Independence Day which takes place on September 18th. On this day we replicated the celebratory events that all Chileans students are accustomed to. First, we decorated the classroom with Chile's national

History

One of the most popular topics studied in History is The Civil Rights Movement in the USA.

This year our Year 11 History students had the privilege of traveling to Hamilton to hear Elizabeth Eckford describe her experiences as a 13 year old school girl attending the first integrated school in Little Rock Arkansas. Elizabeth was one of nine African American students in a school of over 3000 white students and she was one of the group of nine African American teenagers dubbed the" Little Rock Nine". Elizabeth described how she was subjected to daily verbal and physical abuse from white racist students and their parents, which has left her with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. As a participant in the integration of Little Rock Central High School in 1957 her courage to seize the opportunity for a non-segregated education made history. In 1958 Governor Faubus closed all High Schools in Little Rock for the entire year to prevent African American children attending integrated schools, his actions meant that Elizabeth was unable to complete her schooling and was therefore unable to graduate. Our students made the following comments about what had resonated with them



"I was surprised that so many people at Little Rock Central High didn't do anything about the racial bullying. Something that impressed me was that only one of the 'Little Rock Nine' retaliated against the bullying. It was shocking that the experience hurt Elizabeth so much that she got post traumatic stress disorder and for ages couldn't talk about her experience." - Isabel

"I was shocked to know that what had happened around 60 years ago, is still impacting on her life today - psychologically. It had such a deep impact on her, I realised how far and how bad the verbal and physical abuse actually went." - Paige

"I thought that Elizabeth Eckford's speech was shocking, hearing what she experienced, as well as the rest of the black kids that were apart of the 'Little Rock 9'. Hearing how she was racially targeted and verbally assaulted and also what she did to survive and keep her education shocked me." - Caitlyn

"I learnt that Elizabeth Eckford had met the lady shouting at her in one of the two photos and she said we had a lot in common." - Noah

"What I learnt was that people were so racist that they cancelled or closed all the schools just to get their way and what resonated with me was her ideal to resolve things by protesting peacefully and not use violence." - Autumn

Junior Social Studies

2019 was an exciting year in the junior Social Studies curriculum. New programmes such as My Mahi and Sorted were introduced to help with pathways development and financial literacy. A cross-curricular scheme was trialled between English, Mathematics, Science and Social Studies in order to contextualise learning for students. This involved a field trip to Skyline Skyrides and the use of the knowledge acquired to create plans for local tourist attractions.

In other classes, students participated in social actions, particularly the Amnesty International Freedom Challenge, and carried out valuable learning around Human Rights, the Treaty of Waitangi and local history.

A disappointment this year was that Guta Goldstein, a Holocaust survivor who was doing a tour of schools, fell ill and was unable to speak to our students. Hopefully we will be able to hear from a different speaker in the near future.

In a fast changing and often confusing world, Social Studies continues to try to help students make sense of what is happening around them.

As part of our responsibility in a democratic society we should always be involved and question what is happening within our community. As part of Senior Social Studies students are required to be involved whether, it is questioning our government, protecting the environment standing up for injustice this is an important part of our democratic society.

This year students Year 12 students were involved in issues dealing with Human Rights, homelessness and immigration. One of the social actions that the year 12 students were active with was the Love Soup campaign which provides food and resources to the homeless and families in need.

As part of their involvement students organised a number of fundraising activities from bake sales to raffles they raised \$350.00. The class also spent time with Love Soup helping to distribute food from one of their distribution points.

Another social action the Year 12's were involved with is the Ngongotaha stream restoration where they spent the afternoon with the Ngongotaha community planting trees.

Cait says, "At first I thought they were talking about someone else until I realised that it was Isabella and I, then I just couldn't believe it! We won."



GATEWAY

The Gateway programme is designed for students who display a clear direction toward a specific career path. Students gain work experience, workplace training, and unit standard achievements which are related to industry.

A requirement is for each student to gain an additional 20 NCEA credits to their timetabled subjects. Whenever possible, unit standards will be designed around each individual student and their specific place of work, and will also contribute towards their NCEA achievements.

2019 has seen the Gateway programme prove popular with senior students. The traditional areas of engineering, teaching, electrical, plumbing, hospitality, and animal care have once again proven the most sought-after placements.

Once more this year WHHS has been part of the Red Shirts in Schools and SEEDS Gateway programmes run by the Warehouse and Countdown respectively. For ten weeks students attend one of the programmes, gaining over twenty level 2 credits upon successful completion. A number of WHHS students have gained part-time work at Warehouse and Countdown as a direct result of completing the Gateway programme.

Swimming NZ has again provided the opportunity to gain the Level 3 National Certificate in Recreation and Sports (Aquatics), gaining 42 level 3 credits while doing so.

At Western Heights High School we have developed excellent relationships with employers and as a result have been able to place students in a broad range of areas, including: education, aviation, engineering, hairdressing, construction, diesel engineering, electrical supply, animal care, retail, hospitality, plumbing, early childhood education, landscaping, joinery, welding, and radiography.

Bailey Conlon, at the NZSS Swimming AWD Championships, won gold medals in the 100m and 200m Freestyle, as well as in his 100m Individual Medley. He also won silver medals in the 50m Breaststroke, Freestyle and Backstroke and a bronze medal in the 50m Butterfly.

Annelyse Cowie was one of Swim Rotorua's top swimmers at the regional Aquaknights Swimming Championships. Annelyse (15 yrs) dominated her age group to ensure a clean sweep in the breaststroke events, including an excellent time of 1 minute 15.81 seconds in the 100 metre dash. Annelyse also took top honours in the Open age A finals for the 200m Breaststroke and the 400 metres medley.
